Word Wall

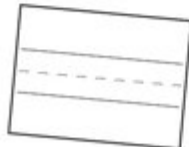
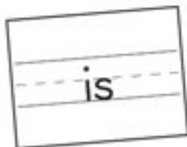
Teachers use Word Walls to help children learn common words. After you play Sight Word reading games with your child, stick the words on a wall in alphabetical order to create your own Word Wall. Each day, refer to the Word Wall and have your child read each word and spell it out loud. For additional fun, time how long it takes to read all of the words and write it down. Have your child try to beat his/her time from the previous day.

Word of the Day

Each day or week, stick a new Sight Word Note somewhere your child will see it often. Have your child say the word and practice writing it on a blank lined note. Throughout the day, see how many times you and your child can find the Sight Word Note written somewhere else or purposely use the word in a sentence. Place the word on your Word Wall when you move on to the next Sight Word.

Word Wall Wizard

Stand in front of your Word Wall and silently select a word. Then, give your child a clue such as "I'm thinking of a word that rhymes with 'see' and starts with the letter 'm' Can you find it?" Take turns being the clue giver.



Story Sentence Scramble

Select a Sight Word Note and then find a sentence in a favorite book that contains the Sight Word on the note. Write the remaining words from the sentence on blank notes (include punctuation). Stick the words up in random order and ask your child to put them back into the correct order.

Stuck on Books

Select a favorite story and guess how many times the Sight Word printed on the Sight Word Note will be found in the story. As you read the story, stick the note nearby and have your child look for the Sight Word on the page. Each time the Sight Word is found, have your child write a tally mark on the Sight Word Note. After the story is finished, count the marks and see how many times the word was found. Did you guess right?
